View from the Vicarage

April 2025

This year Easter falls in April, so let me wish you (prematurely if you are reading this before the 20th) a very Happy Easter.

At Easter, Christians celebrate Jesus' death and resurrection. There are many images associated with Easter; eggs, chickens and bunnies to name but a few; all symbolising the idea of new life. These images reflect the new resurrected life of Jesus and remind us of the promise of a new eternal life that Jesus gives to every believer. Other images include the empty cross and the empty tomb, images that remind us that the love of God, represented in Jesus, cannot be contained. God's love spills over and spreads into every part of life. Part of the work of a Christian is to help that love spread as far as possible. One of my favourite images is that of the confused Mary Magdalene, weeping at the empty tomb and hearing the voice of Jesus call her name "Mary". Hearing him speak her name brings her peace, reassurance and joy.



Timothy Keller once wrote,

"To be loved but not known is comforting but superficial. To be known and not loved is our greatest fear. But to be fully known and truly loved is, well, a lot like being loved by God. It is what we need more than anything. It liberates us from pretence, humbles us out of our self-righteousness, and fortifies us for any difficulty life can throw at us."

To be named is to be known. To be known by Jesus is to be loved. In that love is freedom. Freedom to become the person that God created people to be. This is the freedom that Mary experiences when she hears Jesus call her name, and it empowers her to be the first evangelist. The first to declare with joy and confidence that Jesus is risen, doing everything she could to spread the love of God.

God knows each of us by name, and Jesus calls each of us, by name, to be his followers. The joy and confidence that Jesus offers Mary in her fear and confusion is offered to everyone. Everyone is invited into the Easter story, to encounter Jesus who loved the world so much that he would give his life up so that one by one, name by name, everyone would know that they are unconditionally loved, forgiven and free.

A Easter is on the horizon, but we are not quite there yet. The last Sunday in March and the day on which Mothering Sunday was celebrated was a particularly poignant occasion having lost my mum in February. Her funeral which I had the privilege to lead at St Nicholas was though both a celebration of her ninety years here on earth and also more importantly the time and place when we commit her into the care of the Father.



Remembering the dead is what we do at funerals and celebrants at secular funerals often support and help the bereaved do this well. What they cannot do is frame the person's life in the light of the Gospel - the Good News of Jesus Christ. This, I feel is more important than eulogies and tributes that reel off the person's accomplishments, for in death we are all equal before God, 'We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain that we can carry nothing out.' (1 Timothy 6. 7)

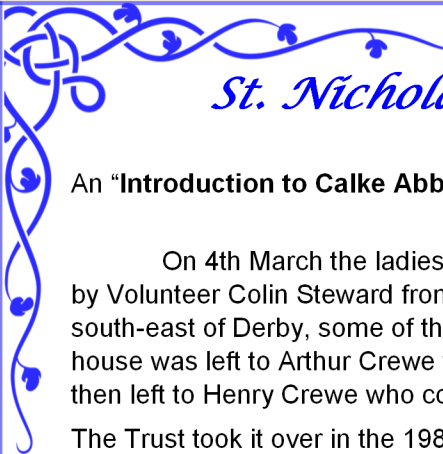
We who are left behind to grieve when a loved one dies are not left totally bereft if we have faith and the hope of new life in Christ. The prophet Job had much to be sorrowful about in his life but he wrote these words, which also appear in the Book of Common Prayer funeral liturgy, 'I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth.' (Job 19. 25) Handel was moved to include these words in The Messiah and this was the piece of music I chose at the end of mum's funeral.

If proof were needed besides a funeral the month of March also saw the family celebrate the baptism of my first grandchild Hester Cecily (although we call her Hetty). In baptism we are washed clean, move from darkness into light, and from death into life. The cycle is complete, the constant in all life and death is the empty Cross, Christ's victory over death and sin and symbol of hope for all people of faith.

Happy Easter.

St. Nicholas' Ladies Group

An "Introduction to Calke Abbey"

On 4th March the ladies enjoyed an "Introduction to Calke Abbey" by Volunteer Colin Steward from the National Trust. Calke is about 15 miles south-east of Derby, some of the lands go over into Leicestershire. The house was left to Arthur Crewe who let it get into disrepair, the property was then left to Henry Crewe who could not afford to keep it due to death duties.

The Trust took it over in the 1980s, spending £3 million on it's renovation. There are 2000 acres, many tenanted farms, plus forests. The parkland covers 440 acres and there is also a deer enclosure.

On the land there were 40 - 42 kilns producing lime; Calke is Latin for lime.

In 1850, lime trees were planted along the access road to Calke where there is a tree, the "Old Man of Calke," reputed to be 1000 years old.

There are many walks, a Visitor Centre - "Calke Explore", the house. Gardens and stables. In 1760 there was a horse called "Squirt" which broke its leg. A stable lad at time said he would look after him. Squirt recovered and went on eventually to sire race horses, his descendants were winners like Shergar, Red Rum and many more.

At Calke, before the house was built, there was a Priory but due to the Reformation, in 1530 it was destroyed. There is an open area in middle of the house which originally would have been cloisters. The house is symmetrical but all four facades are different.

There are many tunnels which have been built, not under the house but to the exterior. One can walk from Brew House to the stables, shop and restaurant through tunnel.

There is the church of St. Giles which is not used often. The house is full of curios and has beautiful embroidered bed curtains and bedding which were a wedding present to one of the family but found in a "box", never used. It is now protected so that visitors can enjoy it. It sounds as if one could spend all day and not see everything.

The Ladies plan to go on the **1st July** for a visit to Calke Abbey. There are only a few tickets left. NT Members - entry is free, coach is £16.50, Non members £21.00 for entry and coach.

Bellringers' visit to John Taylor's Bell Foundry

The bellringers' first outing of 2025 was fortunately arranged for Thursday, 20th March, which proved to be a lovely summers day. A band of 19 ringers, family and friends visited John Taylor's bell foundry in Loughborough, the only remaining bell foundry in the UK, dating back to 1839. They were responsible for casting five of St Nicholas' six bells in 1875, the tenor bell having been cast by Bryan Eldridge in 1656.

The visit included time in the museum followed by a conducted tour of the aged but fascinating factory incorporating the furnace, bell casting and tuning sections, together with steel framework and wooden wheel manufacture and assembly workshops.



Some of the world's largest bells originate from John Taylor's, including 'Great Paul' that hangs in St Paul's Cathedral, weighing almost 17 tons.

After our tour we were able to ring on John Taylor's 12 bells hung in their own tower, a challenging but most enjoyable experience given how light the bells are.

The day finished with the traditional, essential and delicious late lunch in a riverside pub in Barrow on Soar.

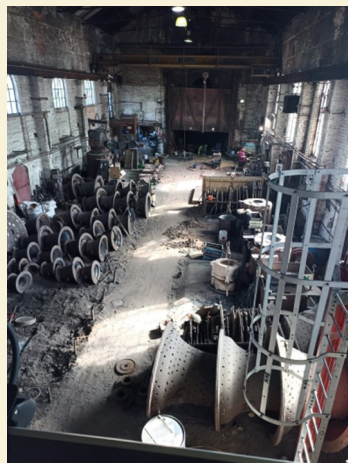

The Song of Heaven on Earth

A primary school teacher recalled standing in front of her class, leading the Lord's Prayer, which she had done for many years, and forgetting the words halfway through! The children probably just continued in that sing-song voice we used to use when reciting it. (Did you used to add an extra syllable to say '*temp-a-tation?*') She was probably too embarrassed to notice! We all know the Lord's Prayer, the prayer recorded directly from the lips of Jesus and found in the gospels of Matthew and Luke. It is perhaps the most famous and influential prayer in the world. People have been profoundly influenced and changed by The Lord's Prayer.

Why is this prayer so powerful? It is a few lines long, yet it provides us with a pattern for praying. And when we do say it, we are linked across two thousand years to so many other Christians who have prayed it in hundreds of languages, and thus to the disciples, hearing it the first time directly from Jesus.

The Archbishop of York, the Most Reverend Stephen Cottrell, called the Lord's Prayer, *The Song of Heaven on Earth* as part of his sermon at York Minster recently. Archbishop Cottrell was launching his 'Lord's Prayer Tour' across the north of England. This initiative invites communities, including schools, to learn the prayer by heart, to understand the words and meaning through teaching, reflection and music.

Mention of the Lord's Prayer has occurred a number of times recently, including on the radio and television, on those few religious programmes which are still broadcast. The leading New Testament theologian, Paula Gooder, talked about this prayer.

✝ ***Our Father in Heaven.***

Paula Gooder described the opening words as radical. It invites us into a relationship with God. And note it is OUR Father, not MY Father – room for us all in this relationship.

✝ ***Hallowed be Thy Name***

The Name of God is very holy and very special. The Father is given His rightful place.

✝ ***Your Kingdom come; your will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.***

That your kingdom may happen on earth as it happens in heaven.

✝ ***Give us today our daily bread.***

This has been translated as 'Give us what we need to flourish, both physically and spiritually.'

† ***Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us.***

Definitely the scariest and the hardest! Sometimes the sin against us is so devastating, so terrible, so difficult to deal with. How could we ever forgive the perpetrator? Yet whether is a major sin, or more trivial, we need to learn to forgive. We know that, because God loves us, he will always forgive us but the pressure is on us here to up our forgiveness game!

† ***Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.***

In Luke's version it reads 'Do not bring us to the time of trial.' Dr. Gooder talks about how hard it was for Jesus, and so how much tougher it is for us. Matthew's version reads 'Deliver us from the evil one', that is, the devil.

† ***For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and forever.***

This was added in the fourth century and became predominant following the Reformation. Some denominations still do not include it.

There is so much to think about and reflect on in one short prayer. If we follow the pattern, the framework of the Lord's prayer in our own prayers, both private and communal, we see a pattern of **ACTS**;

- * 1) **Adoration**
- * 2) **Confession**
- * 3) **Thanksgiving**
- * 4) and only at the end, **Supplication**, asking for things.

During the second half of Lent, try saying Lord's Prayer daily, at a set time, slowly, meditatively - and feel its power. Think about the words and let them flow over you and hear God speak to you. We may all be surprised by this Song of Heaven on Earth.

There are times when I indulge you too much; why I ever let you run your course 'Taking Responsibility for your Church' among our congregation, I am now unable to understand. 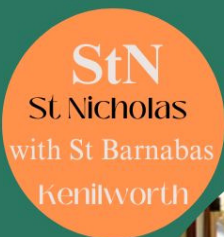

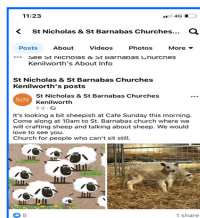
