View from the Vicarage

May 2025

A few years ago, I came across some Kintsugi pottery. Kintsugi is a Japanese art form, where broken household china is mended with seams of gold. The items, which in their broken state had become worthless and useless, are not just restored but are made more beautiful and valuable because of these seams of gold. In Kintsugi the value and beauty of things are seen in their imperfections. Imperfections are celebrated rather than hidden.



Each of us, as great as we are, is imperfect. We are broken by our own wrong-doing but also from the effect of the wrong-doing of others on us, and the hurt and suffering we experience as we live in an imperfect world. Through Jesus' death

and resurrection, God's love, grace and forgiveness pours into us, like the gold in the kintsugi pottery.

God mends us with gold. The love and forgiveness of God makes us whole, celebrates our imperfections and makes us more



beautiful than we were before. We are beautiful, valuable and have purpose because of our healed hurt, not despite it. The treasure of God's love makes us treasures and restores us as containers of God's love that we can pour out on others as we live our lives as followers of Jesus.

The message of Easter, and the Easter season, which lasts until Pentecost on 8th June, is that we are loved and forgiven. We are freed from the need to hide our imperfections. We are treasured containers of God's love, mended with gold.

Frances Butler Leigh went to America 10 years on a Georgian Plantation where a church was set up by James Leigh for black people.

Rowland married an American, Dudley and Agnes were at the opening of Tomb of Tutankhamun they went on to India from there. Margaret married Earl of Jersey who eventually became Governor of New South Wales, they met Robert Louis Stevenson in Samoa.

Rupert went all over world with Army, he was in the Hussars. Gilbert was in Midwest of America 1867, he was at Council of Indians, he goes to San Francisco, Tokyo, Thailand, India.

Sadly Gilbert died in America at a later date. All these travels are known as letters were sent to Sister Cordelia who stayed at home. These are just an introduction and facts given written by myself - for further in depth information it is recommended groups have a talk by Sheila Woolf, it was fascinating.

Mothers' UNION



Anyone passing the Parochial Hall on Wednesday afternoon may have been surprised to see two men struggling with a huge motor bike at the doors. They were riders from **Warwickshire and Solihull Blood Bikes** coming to tell us about their work and what Martin and Pete told us was enlightening and impressive.

Started by a few bikers in 1978, it became the **National Association of Blood Bikes** in 2008, growing to 36

groups all over the country with 5,000 volunteers. They

depend entirely on donations! They are not part of the NHS although they do save them a good deal of money, (estimated at £2,000,000 pa), by transporting blood and urine samples and drugs between hospitals during the hours of 7pm and 6am. In fact, they say that they will carry

anything which fits on the special platform on the back of the bicycle! More recently they have also carried breast milk although those deliveries are made during the day.

The local group, originally called the Warwickshire Free Wheelers, were lent two motor bikes by John Bloor in 2012 and, in 2014 adopted their present title.

Now they have over 100 volunteers made up of riders, drivers and controllers, some of them women.

Although deliveries are usually made at night, over Easter last year they answered 63 calls over 250 hours and they expected similar this year. They also work with the Air Ambulance as their emergency response vehicles can carry pure blood where and when the helicopters cannot, for example at



night. The O+ blood can then be given on the way to hospital and can considerably speed up recovery.

During Lockdown their service was invaluable in delivering medication to housebound patients and nowadays will often deliver to patients being discharged from hospital who might

otherwise have to wait for the pharmacy there.

All riders have to have advanced or enhanced certificate which are updated regularly. There is a lower age limit but no upper one. Their equipment and clothing are top of the range and especially designed for their needs. Martin and Pete managed to bring their bike in to show the details; it has all the gadgets they could possibly want. They are not at the moment equipped with blue light and they have to abide by the same rules as other road users including speed limits. Regular servicing is essential and the tyres are changed every 6,000 miles. Running costs are

approximately £65/70,000 pa. They receive no help from the government relying on their own fund-raising events and Community support.

We began the afternoon with no expectations of what we might learn but it was eye-opening and after a very enjoyable afternoon, we feel we need to help to spread the word about these very caring people and hopefully encourage more fund-raising for them.

Hello everyone,

I hope that you are all well and looking forward to the warmer weather and with the gardens bursting with new life, it is a wonderful time of the year.

Our next Workshop is on **Saturday 10th May at 10.30am** in St Nicholas' Church. Entrance is £3.50 which includes coffee and biscuits. Everyone is welcome, so please come along and bring your friends and family to enjoy a morning of fun with flowers.

I will demonstrate a **Symmetrical arrangement**, a favourite with many people because of its versatility. If you would like to join in the Workshop after the demonstration, the recipe is below.

I look forward to welcoming you and to a happy morning.

A recipe for a Symmetrical Arrangement

A symmetrical design is the most useful of all the shapes as it can be made large for a pedestal or smaller for your home. The recipe is for a smaller design so if you want to make it bigger you will need to increase the quantity of flowers and foliage.

When making any traditional shape, always use at least three different flowers, not just the variety of flower but also the shape - something pointed another round and something as a filler flower.

If you have any queries, please contact me.

A round container this can be flat or raised on a pedestal

Foam to fill which will be on sale from the Flower Guild

9 Roses, Carnations, Gemini, or Dahlias

A bunch of spray Carnations, Alstroemeria, or small Gladioli

Something as a filler flower. Have a look around your garden; Euphorbia is out and the Hosta's are all appearing. Both are fine to use but just make sure you condition them well.

A selection of foliage, some tall, Pittosporum, Mertensia or Griselinia, and some bushy, Hebe, Fatshedera or Skimmia. These are only suggestions, you don't need them all.

A Roman Holiday

I felt very blessed to spend a few days at Easter, staying south of Rome. Whenever possible, I always feel that the Day of Resurrection is best celebrated with our own church community. All Saints' Anglican Chaplaincy, part of the diocese of Europe, is situated off the Piazza di Spagna, in the heart of Rome and was our church for 15 years so it felt like returning to be in our spiritual home, albeit a former one. It was where we were active members, despite it taking an hour and a half minimum to travel in from Genazzano, the village where we lived!

All Saints was always a warm, welcoming and supportive community. We would share Sunday worship then

refreshments in the small walled garden, with its orange, pomegranate and lemon trees – a garden a rare

thing in a city where real estate is at a maximum premium. This might be accompanied by advice on the best way to pay the electric bill or to sort out difficulties with the bank! To be back there on a sunny Easter Sunday morning was a joy and a privilege. All Saints was packed, the service was joyous and the welcome as warm as ever, especially from old friends.



The service is always in English, with parts translated into Italian for the local folks who join us. Anglican chaplaincies were created across the British Empire in the nineteenth century, to cater for the English-speaking community who lived and worked in the locality, such as diplomatic staff. (Where English workers settled more permanently, parish churches were created, such as St. John's, Calcutta). There may be as many as twenty nationalities represented in one service at All Saints – Canadian, Japanese, Madagascan, Australian and so many others.

We were still in Rome when we heard the news that Jorge Mario Bergoglio, born in Argentina, a Jesuit, better known to us as Pope Francis, had died. Rumours had circulated over the

Easter weekend of his increasing frailty and deterioration, but it still came as a sudden surprise. This was a pope of compassion for the poor, who sheltered the homeless in the Vatican and invited them in advance to his funeral. He berated world leaders, speaking truth to power, and toiled for

peace, especially in Ukraine. He worked well with the leaders of other Christian denominations and those of other faiths. But he disappointed women, holding the party line on their role and status in the church.

His funeral will be viewed by millions across the world – as was that of our late Queen Elizabeth. (I am rather relieved that I am not trying to go to Rome this week.) Now we watch and wait for the election of new Pope. (If you have read Conclave by Robert Harris, or seen the film, you have a pretty good idea of how this process unfolds.) Let's pray for a Holy Spirit-led outcome. And may Jorge Mario Bergoglio rest in peace and rise in glory.

So many fond memories were recalled during our time in Italy, and spending Easter day in Rome at All Saints was an honour. The diocese of Europe is the largest Anglican diocese, its communicants spread far and wide, from the Arctic to North Africa and from Ireland to Turkey. If you ever have the opportunity to worship in one of these chaplaincies do take it. We're all members! It really is an unforgettable experience and one you may treasure.

Letter from St James the Least of All -
On why people should ALWAYS sit in the same pew

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from 'Uncle Eustace,' the vicar of St James the Least of All, to his recently ordained nephew, Darren...

St James the Least of All



My dear Nephew Darren

I have to say that the couple who complained that you never noticed they had been missing from church for a month had a point. There is a simple way of noticing when someone is absent: everyone sits in the same pew. Every Sunday. Always.

Little Miss Margison sits in the pew after the third pillar on the right here at St James the Least. As she walks up the aisle, you can sense her counting the pillars until she reaches the right one, which then allows her to sit in front of it. I have speculated that if I ever had that pillar removed, then the following Sunday, she would have a complete mental collapse.

One Sunday a visiting family arrived early and sat down; three people in an empty church seating 200. Colonel Wainwright and his wife were the first of our regulars to arrive and froze in horror. The Colonel said in a deafening whisper to his wife: "There's someone sitting in our pew."

At least they had the grace – no matter how reluctant – for one week, to sit somewhere else. Unlike the Prentice family of husband, wife and three children, who arrived to discover that a visiting family of husband, wife and four children were sitting in their pew; six people in a pew that held eight. Or, it normally holds eight. That Sunday, it held thirteen.

We at least have one iconoclast in Miss Pemberton, who makes a point of sitting in a different place every week. This thoroughly unsettles the rest of the congregation, who fear she may sit in their seats during her nomadic wanderings. I sometimes wonder if she has a chart at home with all the pew spaces marked on it and she strikes one off each week as she returns home after Mattins.

Occasionally the unexpected can happen. Mrs Cholmondeley arrived one week in good time, settled herself in her accustomed place, but half-way through the Service suddenly ran out of the building. Ten minutes later, she was back and in her usual place once again. It was only when the church filled with the smell of burned bacon that we understood.

That is why replacing pews with chairs in your church was a mistake. Pews can never be moved. You know where everybody is – or should be!

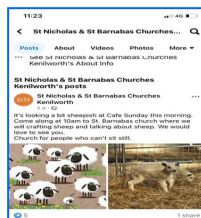

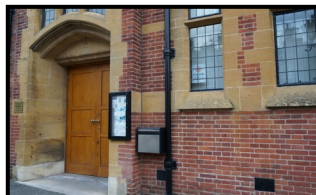
